"While our men are in the United States let us have 10,000 of their young men over here, and I venture to think that the outcome will be such an improvement in industry on both sides of the Atlantic that neither America nor Great Britain need have any fear for the future.

"But anyhow I have perfect faith in Great Britain. The last ten years have been anything but good years for the nation, and yet we are standing foursquare to face our competitors in all parts of the world. We are tried but not defeated by industrial depression. Could we but have a Government the members of which were drawn from the best business brains of the country, irrespective of politics, our recovery, sure though it is, would be infinitely more rapid.
